## 24<sup>th</sup> National Symposium on Child Abuse, Huntsville, AL



Ernie Allen, president and CEO of the National Center for Missing & Exploited Children (NCMEC), served as the keynote speaker March 17-20 for the NCAC's 24th National Symposium on Child Abuse. Held at the Von Braun Center, the conference drew over 1,000 professionals working in multiple disciplines related to fighting child maltreatment.

Allen told those attending the plenary luncheon that tremendous strides have been made in fighting the more traditional types of abuse, but children remain highly vulnerable because of the wide availability of child pornography on the Internet.

J. Robert Flores, Administrator of the Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention (OJJDP) for the U.S. Department of Justice, gave additional remarks. Super Bowl star and New York Giants wide receiver David Tyree attended as a special guest.

Receiving the Inaugural NCAC Outstanding Service Award was Ron Laney, Associate Administrator for the Child Protection Division of OJJDP. Laney, a presenter at the Symposium, has devoted more than 30 years to juvenile justice resulting in the training of more than 500,000 professionals.

Participants had the opportunity to attend 120 workshops with nationally known speakers delivering many of the presentations. Among those workshops were *Community Notification: Protecting Alabamians from Sex Offenders*, *The Adam Walsh Act: A National Endeavor to Protect Children and Families*, and *The (federal) Internet Crimes Against Children Task Force: What It Is and How It Can Help Me*.
